 - Bill S. 171 seeks to improve the management and regulation of waste tires in South Carolina by introducing new requirements and amending existing laws. It establishes a system for waste tire manifests, which are essential records that document the transportation of waste tires, including their origin, destination, and quantity.
 - The bill mandates collaboration between the Department of Environmental Services and the South Carolina Department of Commerce to develop a state plan for efficient waste tire management and promote a circular tire economy.

RMDAC APPOINTMENT UPDATES

Ashley June provides update on the RMDAC (re)appointments.

- The Recycling team continues to work with the Governor's office to determine the status of each council member.

MARKET UPDATES

Metal: Copper was up.

Plastic: HDPE has increased in price. PET is not great. Polypropylene has seen a bit of an increase in price. Companies are monitoring and watching the tariffs to see if that is going to drive up the pricing.

Tires: Senate Bill 171 will be sent to the floor on Tuesday. The \$2.00 fee on new car tires could generate an estimate of \$1.8 million in new revenue. Link to tire recycling legislation: https://www.scstatehouse.gov/sess126_2025-2026/bills/171.htm

Petroleum (Oil): US retail gas prices have been steady, but they a little bit down. They are expected to rise gradually. Global oil demand is expected to rise a little bit in the third quarter. Biodiesel and renewable diesel feedstock prices have continued to rise.

Seeing better prices. Facing uncertainty due to the Clean Fuels Production Credit (section 45Z). Biodiesel and renewable diesel are in a good spot right now.

Glass: Conversations with Goodwill about potentially exploring some pilot opportunities to increase glass collection, using more of a hub-and-spoke model based on residential material. Since so much material ends up at Goodwill, it could potentially serve as a collection point.

Paper: OCC held at \$80 a ton.

Aluminum: US implemented a 25% tariff on aluminum products. Canada has announced reciprocal tariffs of about 29 billion. Total of steel goods will be like almost 13 billion in aluminum goods will be 3 billion. The European Commission's announced, restoration of their tariffs 25% on steel and aluminum. Mexico is going to wait until April 2nd before deciding. In terms of the price, aluminum has been doing well. Aluminum decreased yesterday, but honestly, it's up 8% month over month and 130% year over year. Almost \$2700 a ton.

Carpet: Nylon 6 and 66 there is no change in pricing. The pricing is about the same. PRET is always looking for Nylon 6 and 66 post-consumer carpet.

SC Commerce: Registration is open for the Redwood Materials Supplier Day event on March 19 & 20. Please register and share information about the event.

The big question mark for everyone in our industry right now is what the future will hold in terms of some of the federal policies. Due to changing in leadership in the coming month. No South Carolina specific update.

Municipality: Recycling is steady. As municipalities grow, they are wanting to view recycling programs.

Recycling: The businesses that are still here are still doing business. They are finding more profitable ways to recycle. Seeing a shift in what core business may mean. The Recycling Industry must show that there is a saving.

Solid Waste: Finally seeing increase in solid waste volumes in the landfill from Hurricane Helene. Hurricane Helene was quite a while ago, but the cleanup of that is just now really beginning to hit the landfills because of the materials are mostly contaminated.
